- important to make a positive evaluation of each horse's resemblance to the ideal Arabian and to find the horse that
 best combines the traits listed above. It is easy to find what you don't like about any animal and eliminate horses on
 that basis. However, when a positive evaluation is used, it produces a consistent result that finds the most complete
 horse. All judging involves the ability to find those animals that most resemble the ideal Arabian and to rank them
 accordingly. (See also AR-1/101, 103, 104, 105 and AR-2/115
- For a show to offer this division, the show must also offer at least one class from any one or more of the following divisions: Reining, Reining Seat Equitation, Herd Work, Reined Cow, Working Cow, Cutting, Ranch Riding, Western Trail, Western Dressage or Gymkhana. The In-hand Working Western Performance Stock Horse Halter classes must be held after the conclusion of the other qualifying divisions and classes. To be eligible to compete in this class a horse must enter, show and receive a score in any class or classes from the divisions listed above. A Disqualification (DQ) is not a score.
 - 3. Horses are to be shown in a good working halter (rope, nylon or plain leather). A chain or leather strap, under the chin or leather pieces connecting the two sides of the halter under the chin, are permitted. Horses may also be shown in a working bridle suitable to the age of the horse. Silver is allowed but not preferred over a clean working halter or bridle. Lip Cords and chains are not permitted in the horses mouth.
 - 4. Open, Amateur and Junior Exhibitor classes may be held. Classes will not be split by age. Exception: Prospect class for horses two years old and under at the discretion of show management. Classes must be separated by Arabian and Half-Arabian/Anglo-Arabian. In addition, they must be separated by Arabian-stallion, mare and gelding and Half-Arabian stallion, mare and gelding. All horses three years of age and older must have shown in a performance class in any of the following divisions Reining, Reining Seat Equitation, Herd Work, Reined Cow, Working Cow, Cutting, Ranch Riding, Western Trail, Western Dressage or Gymkhana at the same show in which the In-hand-Working Western Performance Stock Horse Halter class is being offered.
 - 5. All stallions 3 years old and over shall be examined to confirm that they have two visible testicles. If examination reveals that a horse is cryptorchid, such horse should be excused from the ring prior to final placing by the judge.
 - 6. No whips, schooling devices, "bagging" shakers, noisemakers or aids of any kind are permitted. Horses may be shown with bridle path, ears, eyes and nose clipped but it is not mandatory. Cutting Horses may be shown shaved/roached. Horses shown clipped will not be preferred over a horse that is shown natural. Appropriate western attire is required which includes, pants (slacks, trousers, jeans), long sleeves and collar (band, stand up, tuxedo, etc.) western hat and cowboy boots. Western suits with tie or bolo is acceptable. No bling, sequins or rhinestones.
 - 7. The horse's body condition and over all fitness should be assessed. The hair coat should be clean, well-brushed and in good condition. The mane, tail, forelock and wither tuft may not contain ornaments, (ribbons, bows, etc.), hooves should be natural without paint or hoof dressing.
 - 8. Horses will be presented in a relaxed and unstretched manner with the feet squarely underneath the body (no hard stance). Horses will walk to the judge(s) one at a time. As the horse approaches, the judge(s) will step to the right (left of the horse) to enable the horse to trot straight to the cone placed approximately 50 feet (15 meters) away. At the cone the horse will continue trotting, turn to the left making a true "L" and trot toward the next cone placed before the left wall or fence of the arena. After trotting, horses will be lined up head to tail for individual inspection by the judge(s). The judge(s) shall inspect each horse from both sides, front and rear. Excessive schooling, training or shanking, willful abuse, loss of control of the horse by the exhibitor, shall be cause for elimination.
 - 9. At a single judged show, the judge should line the horses to be placed in a head to tail order according to preference.
 - 10. An exhibitor may enter one or more horses in a class, but each horse may have only one rider/handler per class; and, Be It Further
 - Resolved, That the remaining USEF sub-chapters be re-numbered.
